Prop 2

13. Proposal 2 would amend the state constitution to add provisions regarding elections. This amendment would recognize the fundamental right to vote without harassing conduct. Require military or overseas ballots be counted if postmarked by election day. Provide voters right to verify identity with photo ID or signed statement. Provide voter right to single application to vote absentee ballot in all election. Require state funded absentee ballot drop boxes and postage for absentee applications and ballots. Provide that only election officials



may conduct post-election audits. Require nine days of early in person voting. Allow donations to fund elections, which must be disclosed. Require canvass boards certify elections based only on the official records of votes cast.

This survey was conducted October 25 – 29, 2022, with 1543 likely general election voters. It has a margin of error of $\pm 2.50\%$. Known registered voters were interviewed via IVR, SMS, and email invitation. This survey was weighted to a likely general election voter universe.
